## Want to Know More? Get to the Root of It

The Armenian Language is distantly related to English, for this reason, you may re<u>cogn</u>ize certain words (or parts of words). These related words are called <u>cogn</u>ates. Cognates usually have similar consonants, or the consonants exhibit a regular correspondence, e.g., <u>hayr</u> father <u>pater</u>, <u>hats</u> food <u>pasture</u>. Armenian often loses letters, as in <u>li</u> full <u>plenty</u>, <u>yerek</u> three, and sometimes sounds change quite dramatically and uniquely, as in <u>tsnunt</u> <u>kin</u> <u>gen</u>eration, <u>tsanot</u> <u>kn</u>ow pro<u>gnosis</u>, <u>mets</u> <u>meg</u>a, or <u>kakhtsr</u> <u>sweet</u>, <u>kuyr</u> <u>sister</u> <u>so</u>rority. Recognizing cognates can accelerate your mastery of Armenian or any foreign language. Try to think of Armenian as an extension of the English you already know.

**Cognate Key:** The phrases above consist of roughly 80 distinct words, more than half of which are cognates. Here are a few cognates to get you started:
